FROM WHERE I SIT...

... the ending is often a return to the beginning.

As I come to the end of my time here as president of Padua Franciscan and this last reflection for the *Paduan* magazine, I am mindful of the words of the English poet T.S. Eliot in his composition *Four Quartets*. The fourth quartet is the poem *Little Gidding* which contains the lines:

What we call the beginning is often the end

And to make an end is to make a beginning.

The end is where we start from.

And the end of all our exploring

Will be to arrive where we started

And know the place for the first time.

In preparation for this reflection, I went back to the "beginning" – the first year of my role as president, and the reflections which I wrote for the *Paduan* at that time. And I found that the themes which were the focus of my reflection then are indeed the themes that have been most in my mind and heart as I come to this time of "ending."

In that first issue of the *Paduan* for which I wrote in the fall of 2003, I reflected on the excitement and the adventure of this new role, stating:

...this is what I want to say to you most of all, and what I want you to understand especially: how aware I am of what has been given over to my care – the people and the mission of Padua Franciscan High School. How grateful I am and how committed I am to the service of this marvelous and wonderful gift!

I will admit that, if I think about this only with regard to myself and the responsibility that is mine, then all of this can be a bit overwhelming and cause for not a little fear and trepidation. But when I reflect on all of this in the light of who we really are as one Padua Franciscan community,

I am much relieved. I welcome, I need, and I depend upon your support, your encouragement, your wisdom and insight, your experience, your energy, your involvement. It is not my Padua Franciscan High School; it is **ours**. We are all of us – students and faculty, staff and administrators, parents and families, alumni and alumnae, friends and benefactors – all of us partners together in this marvelous endeavor.

So now in 2013, as I hand on to others what had been given to my care, I am especially aware of all who have been my partners in these past years, and I am deeply and thankfully conscious of that truth that Bruins are always better together!

In the winter of 2004, I wrote:

... always at the very center, at the very heart of all that we do is vision and perspective, and the challenge to keep our focus. For Saint Francis it seemed so simple, so easy, so straight-to-thepoint: to follow the teaching and the footprints of our Lord, Jesus Christ. For Saint Anthony of Padua it was equally succinct: to learn and teach while never extinguishing the spirit of prayer and devotion.

As a Catholic and Franciscan place of learning, have we shared, are we sharing the light of the gospel, the inspiration of Francis and Clare and Anthony that provide that center, that vision? Are we helping those who come to us to follow the teaching and the footprints of our Lord Jesus Christ? to be involved in the variety of activities and events of daily life while never extinguishing the spirit of prayer and devotion?

As I look back over the ten years since writing those lines, I hope that I have helped our Padua Franciscan community in some small way to keep that focus, to follow that vision, and to live those ideals. And I trust that this will continue to be the commitment that is at the heart of all that Padua Franciscan is and does each day in all the years ahead.

And, finally, in the summer of 2004.

my reflection was based on this thought:

...cultivating and living out of a spirit of gratitude and appreciation is perhaps our most important and, at times, our most challenging endeavor.

Thankfulness is certainly at the heart of the Christian life... Francis of Assisi certainly understood this central truth and lived out of that spirit. His life of poverty and simplicity was founded on the deep and abiding realization that everything – absolutely everything that we have and are – is God's gift. The joy and the peace that permeate the mind and heart, the words and actions of Francis of Assisi come from his unwavering confidence in the generous God who is always ready to and does indeed provide for our every need.

And so I come to this time certainly filled with deep gratitude and appreciation – thankful for the great privilege of this ministry... thankful for the gifts and graces which the goodness of God has provided through so many persons and through countless experiences, always meeting every need... and unwaveringly confident that God will continue to watch over and care for this community and its daily work.

Indeed, as T.S. Eliot says, it has been my experience that to come to the end is to arrive where I started. And just so, for Padua Franciscan and for myself ...to make an end is to make a beginning. The end is where we start from. For me, the ending is full of thankfulness. May our beginnings be filled with God's blessings of peace and everything good – always.

DREAMS

DO COME TRUE -



Among Jennifer (Melchior '88) Hansen's earliest memories is at age four, driving through a snowstorm with her family to see Snow White on the big screen. Today, a figurine of the seven dwarfs sits perched on the bookcase in her office at Radio Disney.

"You wouldn't say I was fanatical about Disney as a child, but I am now. I love what I do here," Hansen said.

And her career path is evidence of that, having been promoted this year from executive director of sales to vice president of ad sales.

A silver Mickey Mouse pin adorns her royal blue blouse lapel. "I wear a piece of Disney jewelry everyday, even on the weekends, to remind me of the brand I represent," said Hansen.



ehind her desk, a black and white poster of Walt Disney fills the wall. To paraphrase Hansen's favorite Walt Disney quote - You can dream...but first it requires people to make that dream a reality. And the pathway to her dream job has been paved with people and opportunities to guide her along.

LIFE AT PADUA

As a 1988 Padua graduate, Hansen was one of those students who loved school and embraced all it had to offer. She was a member of Key Club, the National Honor Society, and the French Club. She played guitar at Mass and sang in the choir.

Padua colors run in the family, as Hansen's father, Bill Melchior, was a member of the first graduating class, back in 1965. Hansen, herself, holds the distinction of being the first daughter of an alumnus to attend Padua. "I loved Padua. A lot of who I am and the work ethic I have comes from my parents and my years at Padua," Hansen said.

"My time at Padua challenged me to think and ask questions. I was never shy. My parents always encouraged me to speak my mind and put myself out there," Hansen said. And what better place to do so than the stage? After landing the lead in the high school theatre production of *Our Town*, Hansen went on to play in *Godspell* and *Camelot* at local theatres including the Greenbrier and The Royalton Players.

A MIND FOR BUSINESS

In 1991, Hansen graduated from Baldwin-Wallace College, with a bachelor of arts degree in psychology and a minor in business. "I originally thought I wanted to be a psychologist, but after taking a business course, I became intrigued with the psychology behind business," Hansen said.

She obtained her degree in 2.5 years, while working full time as a counter manager for Estée Lauder, in Dillard's department store. Responsible for hiring and training sales staff and driving revenue, she created new sales events resulting in increased revenue for the make-up and skin care giant.

A MOVE SOUTH

Marrying soon after, she and her first husband moved to Montgomery, Alabama. Here Hansen had the opportunity to put her psychology education to use in the non-profit sector.

From 1993-1995, she held the position of associate director of development for the Alabama Shakespeare Festival, helping

with fundraising efforts, developing revenue plans and budgets, and managing over 100 volunteers.

In 1995, at twenty-six years old, she became the executive director of the Montgomery Ballet. During that time, the Ballet Pensacola also retained Hansen to develop their annual fundraising strategy.

By 1996, Hansen came to understand the phrase 'there's not a lot of profit in nonprofit' and began to look for her next career move. "No one is going to give it to you, you have to make your own destiny," said Hansen.

DESTINY FOUND

The de-regulation of radio stations had brought great changes to the broadcast industry. "It opened up the market to buyers across the board," said Hansen, who saw her next move when a local Montgomery media company posted a position for sales account executive.

With her sales and fundraising background, Hansen reasoned if she could ask for a donation, and in return give a well-written thank you note and smile, she could probably sell radio. She learned quickly and soon moved on to a position as regional sales manager for another local broadcast company.

In 1997, with her career in radio sales in full swing, Hansen remarried. With experience in launching a new station, training sales staff and overseeing revenue budgets and forecasts, it was just a matter of time before opportunity came knocking again.

THE JOURNEY HOME

When a position as station manager for Radio Disney Cleveland opened up in 2000, Hansen knew it was time to go home. Not surprisingly, by 2004 her sales and management skills saw her promoted to regional director, overseeing operations for Radio Disney stations across the northeastern United States.

What's different about life at Radio Disney from her previous radio positions? While serving clients to the best of her ability has remained a constant, Hansen says the difference is in the market. "It's not so much about the medium, but the process. I'm providing them access to a unique audience," said Hansen.

Driven by the 5,000 countrywide events they host annually, Radio Disney creates a consumer reach that extends beyond the airwaves. Events range from appearances at baseball games and local fairs, to events staged at area malls and zoos.

Advertisers are all about reaching that family audience. "Our true claim is our ability to work hand in hand with our partners," Hansen said. "Here in Cleveland, we have great partnerships with the Cleveland Indians and the Cleveland Zoo."

It's no surprise that Radio Disney has a family based audience. Their sweet spot is the 9 to 11 year olds or tweens, whose majority of listening time is had within the confines of the family vehicle, with Mom (or Dad) at the wheel.

And with such a young audience comes great responsibility. "There's always a balance between what the sponsor may want and maintaining the integrity of the Disney brand," said Hansen. Sponsors range from mass retail giants to wireless providers, and from auto dealerships to healthcare institutions. When working with a client, Hansen said she looks for the mutual win – helping the client achieve their objectives, while making sure it feels right for the Disney brand.

With concerns over today's lifestyle choices, Radio Disney implements fun health and fitness programs that inspire healthier lifestyles in support of Disney's Magic of Healthy Living, an initiative designed to partner with parents to inspire kids to lead healthier lifestyles. By providing engaging content and useful tools, their healthy living initiative makes nutritious eating and physical activity more appealing and fun.

YOUR MUSIC, YOUR WAY

Located at 1260 on the AM dial in Cleveland (frequency of former WIXY radio of the 60s and 70s), Radio Disney offers listeners much more than music. And while Great Lakes Mall may be an unlikely venue for a beach party, that's exactly the type of entertainment that keeps bringing the kids back for more. A chance to hang out with the Radio Disney Road Crew, participate in games and activities, and have their pictures taken against a beach backdrop, draws an audience for an evening of good, clean fun. Crossing mediums, this event also helped create buzz for the premiere of Teen Beach Movie, which aired exclusively on the Disney Channel.

Launched in 1996, Radio Disney is the #1, 24-hour radio network devoted to kids, tweens and families, and can be found in markets across the country from Boston to Atlanta, Sacramento to Indianapolis, and Detroit to Houston. Kids help pick the music that is played and are encouraged to interact. With a toll-free call in request line, a Top-30 Countdown posted on their website, and a Friday Night Talent Show, which allows callers to phone in and sing tunes karaoke style, the Radio Disney tagline - Your Music, Your Way – says it all.

"Appealing to kids and moms alike, Radio Disney is a part of pop culture," said Hansen. From today's pop icons Taylor Swift and Selena Gomez to the Mom's Throw Back! Sweepstakes featuring music sensation Boyz II Men, it's a brand that product sponsors want to engage.

LEANING IN - HER CAREER, HER WAY

Facebook's COO Sheryl Sandberg's recent release of Lean In, a manifesto on women and the workplace, has drawn attention to the work-life balance issues that keep many women from realizing their full career potential.

Hansen, whose workday starts with checking email at 6:30 a.m. and may end at 10:00 p.m. with a phone call from anywhere in the country, is no stranger to the challenges of finding balance, as her work takes her across four time zones.

Following her promotion earlier this year, her new duties as vice president of ad sales for the Radio Disney Station Group include the management of 300+ people, leading sales strategy and driving advertising revenue for all of their stations across the country. And with new duties, comes more travel. Monthly trips to New York, meetings in Burbank, California, every other month, and visits to all the markets in between make for a fulfilling, yet demanding job.

Whether she's speaking to new staff, overseeing client initiatives or providing sales training, Hansen's sales philosophy can be seen throughout her daily dealings. "It's not about the project, but about the person I'm speaking with – how can I help them reach their goal or potential?"

As Sandberg offers a blueprint for women striving to reach their potential as industry leaders in the corporate world, Hansen enjoys imparting her sales knowledge to help others grow their careers. "Women do exceptionally well in radio, from sales to management," said Hansen. Instilling in others the ability to follow their gut instinct when working with potential sponsorship clients, as well as developing a feeling for whether the consumer will understand the client's message, are areas where Hansen excels.

Hansen believes that directing sales teams is like steering a ship - a slight shift in course will set you moving in a whole new direction. "With our sales teams dispersed across the country, it's important to feel a connection to the company. My interaction with our teams bridges that distance – nothing replaces eye to eye interaction," Hansen said.

While her copy of Lean In sits on her nightstand at home, awaiting time to be read, Hansen has already embraced many of Sandberg's ideals. Take your rightful place at the table, take risks that stretch your abilities, and make your life partner your career partner as well.

Sandberg holds the belief that for women to be more empowered at work, men must become more engaged at home. Hansen would agree. "My husband is my sounding board. He's very supportive - I couldn't do what I do without him."

THE MEASURE OF SUCCESS

While radio sales can be a cutthroat industry, Hansen says that's not so at Radio Disney. She attributes the success most find at Disney to the company's culture. While the sales team as a whole is spread out across the country, there's a sense of team spirit. "It's a viral community – there's lots of help available to any sales member who asks," Hansen said.

Hansen says she's started to see generational differences in how her sales team looks for prospects. While seasoned professionals might still look to the newspaper, for the younger set it's all about social media. "LinkedIn has changed their world," said Hansen.

What's the one common thread for success at Radio Disney? "They have to come in the door with the want to," said Hansen. "Anyone can be successful when they put their mind to it." In today's business world, where there seems to be a growing sense of entitlement, Hansen is quick to point out that the business world is still a two-way street. "You have to bring something to the party."

Hansen certainly practices what she preaches. Starting this September, she'll be enrolled in the MBA program at MIT in Boston. Course work will require her to be on campus every three weeks for Friday and Saturday classes and once every six months for a whole week of classes. "I realized I missed learning," said Hansen. "I think it's important to seize the opportunity to continue to learn and grow." And it's no surprise that Disney is supportive of her ambition, for Walt Disney himself embodied the spirit of wonder and curiosity.

EMBRACING TECHNOLOGY

From the first drawings, penned in 1928, of the iconic Disney symbol Mickey Mouse, technology has moved us forward at a speed that even Walt Disney could not have imagined. From streaming music online at RadioDisney. com to the Radio Disney iPhone and Android apps, the company quickly adopted emerging technology, as its growing audience became more tech savvy.

With Radio Disney's web presence, listeners can log in online to request songs, or phone in their requests toll free. They can then choose to continue listening online or over the AM radio dial. Radio Disney is also available on the iTunes radio tuner, as well as on Sirius XM satellite radio — Channel 79, both in the United States and Canada.

Regardless of which medium they choose, the goal is to draw listeners with quality content. "Our focus is on the content, not where or how our listeners engage with that content." said Hansen.

From websites to social media, Disney would have been enchanted by the possibilities.

Or perhaps he would have seen a need to balance the new with the old. As is true with most things in life, finding balance can be the true key to success.

FINDING BALANCE

Life within the wonderful world of Disney may be a long way from the make-up counter at Dillard's department store, but the drive to be the best she can be, at work or play, is at the core of all Hansen's successes.

When she's not at the office or traveling for work purposes, Hansen is home with her Newfoundland dogs, or on the road headed to a dog show. Fully supportive of her career and canine companions alike, sales of her husband's photographs of the dogs help support canine cancer research.

Originally bred as working dogs for fishermen in the Dominion of Newfoundland, now part of Canada, this large canine breed is known for its water rescue and draft skills.

After numerous visits to a top breeder, conveniently located in Cleveland, the Hansens had a serious case of puppy love.

That was eight years ago. Today, they own three showquality dogs. In the world of design and architecture, it's said that balance is best achieved in sets of three. Perhaps the same can be said when looking for balance in life. "They're my kids," said Hansen, as she glanced towards a photograph of the threesome displayed on her desk.

Can we help to introduce you to Cleveland? Have you ever been to an Indians game? Where do you live? Do you speak Italian? What will we discuss at the 8:00am meeting? Where did you grow up? Have you ever run a business? Will you be at the prom? Who is this new kid on the block and what is he going to do at Padua?

I have been peppered with these questions, and many others as well, since my arrival here on March 1. But I have also been offered a welcome beyond what I expected, a welcome that speaks highly of the familial and community spirit that permeates the walls of Padua Franciscan. A change in leadership always causes some uncertainty and edginess, so allow me to share with you a little of who I am.

I grew up on the south side of Chicago, in the "baddest part of town" as the song reminds us. I played many sports in high school and college, my favorite being the goal keeper in hockey. I'm afraid if I'd ever try to get back on the ice today the EMTs would carry me off!! I'm a card-carrying, life-long Cubs fan looking forward to a repeat of the last winning World Series of 1908. I have been a Franciscan Friar for more than 44 years and a priest for 36, ordained in 1977. Some of the more interesting spots might include China, Tibet, Australia, Canada, New Zealand, Germany, Italy, Aruba, Mexico, Switzerland, Communist Poland, England and Ireland. God has watched over me and blessed me over the years with some wonderful ministries and challenges, and now none the least being the community of Padua Franciscan.

This descriptive nutshell identifies some of who I am and what I'm about. I bring my gifts and talents to Padua with a three-pronged agenda of strengthening the Spirituality, Community, and Mission of Padua Franciscan. In my brief time among you I've identified a number of areas that need our attention and I trust Padua Franciscan can count on your generosity and time. I've been directed over and over to "contact us if you should need our help"...and this obedient friar will follow your lead!




THE RENOVATION

of the Padua Franciscan Gymnasium

BE A PART OF IT!

Aside from a wooden floor installed in 1991, the gym is pretty much the way it was when the school opened in 1961... except that the original wooden bleachers are badly cracked, and their steel framing screams and groans when opened. On a good day, you can pull them open all the way. The lighting and sound systems need to be replaced with 21st Century technology. The walls and ceiling need a bright coat of paint (you can still see the original color in some places), and the facing around the stage (proscenium) has taken one too many hits from baseballs escaping the batting practice nets. For a place that hosts dozens of performances, liturgies, and sporting events each year, it certainly is in need of a complete renovation! That complete make-



over is now underway with scheduled completion in August.

The total price tag of the renovation project exceeds \$160,000...and will include new lighting, sound system,

floor refinishing, painting, stage re-facing and new bleachers. Padua is offering alumni, parents, and friends an opportunity to put their mark on this historic facelift of "the Bruin Den."

FR. TED HAAG, O.F.M., Celebrates End of Term

On May 19, the Padua community celebrated the closure of Fr. Haag's tenure as the fourth president of the school with a Mass and brunch held in his honor. As the administrative and spiritual leader of Padua Franciscan, the event was an appropriate, symbolic end to his past twelve years; two years working in Campus Ministry and ten as president of the institution.

During his presidency, Padua has seen many advances, the most notable being the creation of the MedTrack program. Other improvements occurring under his leadership include:

- The installation of stadium lighting
- Construction of the underground wrestling room
- Transformation of the former AV room into an interactive media center
- Acquisition of the 19 acres of Camp Cord and subsequent creation of soccer/lacrosse fields
- Introduction of wireless internet access throughout the campus
- Air conditioning of the student cafeteria
- · New biology lab
- Campus signage, including new electronic marquee
- Installation of the prayer garden
- Renovation of the gymnasium



These are just a few of the accomplishments, although other improvements and renovations are evident throughout the building and grounds. Fr. Ted was also instrumental for dramatic increases in student financial aid programs, a topic very close to his heart.

For this reason and in honor of his decade of leadership, the Fr. Theodore J. Haag, O.F.M., Financial Aid Fund was created. Administered by the Padua Franciscan High School Endowment Trust, this perpetual source of income will be used to make a Padua education possible for many young people who could not otherwise afford full tuition.


Did You Know? MedTrack Pays Off!

HARVARD PROFESSOR TOM EISENMANN '75

Delivers Commencement Address



"If you can't fail, you can't learn.

And if you can't learn, you can't improve."



A 1975 graduate of Padua Franciscan, **Thomas R. Eisenmann** is the Howard H. Stevenson Professor of Business Administration at the Harvard Business School and Faculty Co-Chair of the HBS Rock Center for Entrepreneurship. He also has studied what it takes to be a success, and sometimes that involves failure. This was the topic of his address to the Class of 2013 during Commencement exercises on May 31.

In his remarks entitled You Can Fail Better, Tom recalled his own confrontations with failure, beginning with being benched and then quitting the Padua baseball team:


"Failure came into sharper focus for me years later when I started studying entrepreneurs. I learned that running from failure, like I did at Padua, is a common response. Our egos are easily bruised, so we often avoid situations where we might fail. But the best entrepreneurs are different. They seek out new challenges and view failure as a necessary part of the learning process. If you can't fail, you can't learn. And if you can't learn, you can't improve.

Professor Eisenmann received his doctorate in business administration ('98), MBA ('83), and BA ('79) from Harvard University. Prior to entering the HBS Doctoral Program, Eisenmann spent eleven years as a management consultant at McKinsey & Company, where he was co-head of the Media and Entertainment Practice. Eisenmann currently serves as a director on the boards of Harvard Business Publishing and Harvard Student Agencies, the world's largest student-run corporation.

"If you want to fail better, accepting risk is just half the battle. The other half is learning from our mistakes. As Henry Ford said, 'The only real mistake is the one from which we learn nothing.'... So, Class of 2013, I hope you find great happiness and success. But I hope you embrace failure, too, as a path to improvement. And I hope you'll live by the words of the playwright Samuel Beckett: "Ever tried. Ever failed. No matter. Try again. Fail again. Fail better."

"I knew going in, I had a slight chance of getting picked up," he continued, noting that he didn't even watch the draft on TV. "I had seven teams with offers, and San Diego was a situation I couldn't pass up. It was the best fit for me and the best chance to make the team." With the contract, Molls is guaranteed a spot at training camp, but nothing after that is guaranteed. Molls is currently in San Diego and rooming with former Notre Dame linebacker Manti Te'o.



Padua Figure Skaters Claim Another State Championship

This year's Ohio High School Team
Figure Skating Championships came
down to the final event of the weekend,
but in the end it was the Bruins of
Padua claiming their fourth State
Title in six years, holding off perennial
power Shaker Heights.

"It's probably the best one that we've won because we were the underdogs going in," said Padua senior **Casandra Hipkins**. "We have a lot of underclassmen on the team and 7th and 8th graders. We only have 13 people opposed to the 24 of Shaker."

Hipkins along with **Alexandra Kay**

and Andriana Nativio are the lone seniors for the Bruins. Those three are joined by junior Alexandra D'Amico; sophomores Marissa Impala and Michaela Pinzone; freshmen Angela Graham, Courtney Kriausky, Andrew Spagnola, and Janelle Spagnola; 8th Graders Kara Buhar and Laura Senkar, and 7th Grader Jessica Monaghan.

The title marks the sixth straight year Padua has placed either first or second as a team. The Bruins won it all in 2008, 2010, and 2011 as well, in addition to placing second in 2009 and 2012.

Tyler Ptacek '13 breaks all-time school scoring record

Just moments into his senior basketball season, **Tyler Ptacek** made it known that this would be a special year, scoring his 1,000th career point less than a minute into a game at Valley Forge.

On February 15, he took special to a whole new level by netting the 1,332nd point of his career, breaking Padua's all-time school scoring record originally set by **Ken Kowal '67** in 1967.

"I wish he was only a freshman," said Padua head coach Jake Lantz of Ptacek with a laugh. "Truthfully, that's years of hard work and dedication. It's a testimony to him. That record stood for a long time, and I don't know if that one will be broken for another 40 years. It's hard work in the offseason that got him that record."

He will attend the University of Evansville next year.

SCHMOTZER-ISMS

HARTSVILLE — If Dan Schmotzer is lyin', he's dyin'. The Coker College men's basketball coach has many stories about his twin brother Dave who coaches the Cobras' baseball program. But he has one in particular that he loves and he swears it's true.

Dan says the brothers were playing summer baseball in the early 1970s in a league sponsored by the Cleveland Plain Dealer, their hometown newspaper. Dave had tied the league's single-season stolen base record and was poised to break it. And sure enough, the next time he got on base, he swiped second. It might have been one of the easiest stolen bases ever, because the ball got away from the catcher and Dave made it safely without a throw.

That was too easy for Dave's teammates, who heckled him from the dugout because he broke the record on a play that wasn't clean. "We were all like, 'You can't count that!" Dan said. In true Schmotzer fashion, Dave wasn't going to take that without doing something about it. So on the next pitch or so, he stole another base. Not third base, but first. "Then on the next pitch, he steals second the right way and he looked at us and said, 'Told ya,'" Dan said. "That really happened, and to this day, it's one of the funniest things

I've ever seen. It was ridiculous." Anyone who finds that story hard to believe probably doesn't know Dave Schmotzer all that well. If anyone might pull such a stunt, it's him.

Guaranteed, he didn't do it to be funny. More likely, he did it just to show something to anyone who doubted him. It's not cockiness, but simply a tough quality he possesses, the same one he tries to instill in his baseball team these days.

The Cobras have displayed that toughness over the past month on a magical run to the Conference Carolinas tournament championship and the Division II Southeast Regional title. They begin play in the D-II National Finals on Sunday in Cary, N.C.

It's a long way from Cleveland of the 1960s and Dave's playing days at Padua Franciscan High School. He was the shortstop and Dan was the second baseman, a twin killing combination in a literal sense. They both played baseball and basketball in high school and in college at St. Edward's (another of the eight finalists in Cary, by the way) in Austin, Texas, before returning to their hometown in search of a job.

They found a couple at Trinity High School, a Catholic school in the Cleveland suburb of Garfield Heights.

"We graduated from college and didn't know what we wanted to do," Dave said. "Man, we were neophytes. We were children of the '60s, still trying to figure out where we parked the car. "The principal, Sister Catherine (Britton) said, 'OK, which one of you wants to coach basketball and which one of you wants to coach baseball?' We didn't know, so we flipped a coin. Dan won and picked basketball, so I coached baseball, and we were each other's assistant."

At that point, Dave said he still had no idea he would end up making a career out of coaching. But over the next few years, he figured out he liked what he was doing. Then he got the itch to see if he could do it at a higher level. Dan left Trinity first, getting a job as a basketball graduate assistant at Texas Christian University. About a year later, Dave said he got a call from his brother to tell him there was a baseball job open if he wanted it.

Dave jumped at the chance and stayed at TCU for about a decade. The Horned Frogs were then playing in the old Southwest Conference. Schmotzer remembers playing against a Texas team coached by Cliff Gustafson, who had a pitching staff consisting of future major leaguers Roger Clemens, Calvin Schiraldi and Bruce Ruffin. "I was like, 'Wow, look at this baseball,'" Schmotzer said. "And you start to think maybe you can do this on your own."

He left TCU for Union College in Barbourville, Ky., where he stayed for three seasons as baseball coach and athletic director. Again, Dan had already left TCU for Coker and one day called his brother to tell him about a job opportunity in Hartsville. Coker was just starting a baseball program and Dave had the opportunity to build something from scratch.

Dave recruited for a year before the Cobras hit the field in NAIA, and the program got off to a fast start. The 1993 team won 32 games, and the '94 went 48-12, advancing to the NAIA World Series. The next season, the Cobras came close to making the World Series again. After a move to the NCAA, though, things turned south for the program. A good year here or there were sprinkled in with way too many bad ones.

"We went from progression to regression," Dave said. "You believe in what you do. You're dotting the i every day. You're the first to get there and the last to leave, but you're not getting those wins like you used to.

"You take that home and it just kills you, man. It just turns your stomach because you've got to deal with all that crap. You've got to deal with unhappiness, not only from your players but from people who want to know what's going on here."

But now ...

"We've climbed the mountain again," Dave said. "It's humbling and it's satisfying. You taste it again and you remember how proud you used to be." Alumni from past teams, especially from the 1994 squad, have been calling and sending messages left and right since the Cobras' regional victory, and even before. "I can't keep up with it. It's unbelievable," Dave said.

The 1994 year obviously brings back fond memories. Not just the winning, but some people, including two who are no longer around. Dave and Dan both said their parents, mom Laverne and dad Ray — especially Ray — were both influential figures. Both are now deceased. Ray knew a little something about baseball, too, having coached at St. Edward's in 1974 and '75, Dan said. "I remember Dad coming down to watch that '94 team," Dave said. "Very few people are going to have an influence in your life. They don't have enough time for you or you don't want to listen to that crap.

"But your dad, you listen to. It was your dad that made you who you are. My dad

was a shining light and he still is."

There were others. At Padua Franciscan, the Schmotzers were coached by Chuck Priefer, who went on to assistant coaching positions in college at Miami (Ohio), North Carolina, Kent State and Georgia Tech and in the NFL with the Packers, Chargers and Lions. "He's the guy who instilled a no-nonsense approach to preparation and application," Dave said. "He was hard on Dan and me." Dave, too, is hard on his players. And they love it. If practice isn't going particularly well, he might stop the workout and chew them out for a couple of minutes. But he doesn't mind listening, either.

"He'll respect your opinion and take it to heart," senior catcher Frank Suarez said. "You can talk to him at any time and he always has an answer for everything."

Of course, "He's a bit of a loudmouth, but ...," Suarez said, laughing.

Talkative, a bit sarcastic, wisecracking — it's a side of Schmotzer his players seem to like. He can take it, but he can dish it, too. "He has a spunk that he can come back at you with something and you don't know what he said," Suarez said.

Anyone who plays for him has to get used to Schmotzerisms. Here are a few, translated by Suarez:

"Show me the baby."

Suarez: "That's what he says when he just wants you to get the job done."

"I can get a fat man in a blue suit across the street to try."

Suarez: "He's saying don't just give effort. He wants the best you have and he wants it right every single time."

"Get into the microwave."

Suarez: "I don't really know what that means."

Schmotzer does have a way with words, and they often have something to do with food. A reporter calling him up for an interview often doesn't even have to ask a question to get the conversation started. Case in point, take a couple of days before the Cobras went to Mount Olive, N.C., for the regional. The phone rings, Schmotzer answers, and after the obligatory exchange of pleasantries, he offers this up:

"I'm staring at the biggest jar of applesauce you ever could see. We all eat the same apple sauce and we're just trying to eat more apple sauce than the rest of those guys."

And yes, he does have a big jar of apple-sauce in his office, for what it's worth.

And this, on Coker's success being a "bill-

board," as he puts it, for the college and for the athletic program: "It's an awesome salad to eat."

Schmotzer himself gets a chuckle out of the things he says sometimes. But all he knows is this: If winning baseball games really is like eating, the Cobras are still chowing down, and they're in the middle of the main course. Will they make it to dessert?

"There're eight teams left in the country," Schmotzer said. "Coker College is one of them. Let's go see where it falls."


PADUA FAMILY MOURNS LOSS OF JJ Marino '08

Joseph "JJ" Marino '08, a Kent State University senior accounting major, was tragically killed in an automobile accident in Alabama on March 30 while returning from Spring Break. On Easter Sunday, more than 90 of his friends, hockey teammates, and other classmates spontaneously gathered at Padua Franciscan to focus on his life and memory. They contacted Fr. Ted Haag, O.F.M., inviting him to join with them in prayer.

COUNSELOR & COACH Remembering Joe Vadini
