FROM WHERE I SIT...


Hello Bruins!!

BUILDING A BUSINESS BASED ON BAD BEHAVIOR

fter 15 years in the catering and event business, **Bob Pacanovsky** '83 is focusing his experience and expertise on helping companies and individuals "outclass the competition." Aside from providing consulting and planning for major events, the most visible aspect of his firm, the Vātion Group, involves training and consulting with businesses, colleges, and organizations on the topics of branding, behaviors, and professional etiquette.

Having provided meals and entertainment at more than 7,000 events, Pacanovsky has observed more than a few abhorrent behaviors in his day. Alcohol may have been involved in many instances, but bad manners and even worse social etiquette is rampant, he says. Bad behavior can affect both the individual and employer, whose reputations are often inexorably connected.

"You always carry your personal brand with you in everything you do," he says. His mantra is more than a lesson in morals or personal ethics, it is all about how you, your credibility, and your personal worth are perceived by others; and that perception, says Pacanovsky, directly relates to your value as a person, as an employee, and as an asset or liability in the marketplace.

Today, with the exponential growth of social media, even a momentary lapse in judgement in public can get posted on Facebook or worse. Even more idiotically, many people post pictures or comments of questionable taste on their own pages, where employers or recruiters are likely to see them. Pacanovsky quotes Warren Buffet

who said "It takes 20 years to build a reputation and five minutes to ruin it. If you think about that, you'll do things differently." Pacanovsky also relates the story of a young woman who posted this in April after being hired at a daycare center: "I start my new job today, but I absolutely hate working at daycares. Lol it's all good, I just really hate being around a lot of kids." Her post went viral, and you can imagine the outcome.

A BACKGROUND OF SERVING AND OBSERVING


Graduating from the University of Akron in 1988 with a degree in Finance, Pacanovsky is a born entrepreneur. He started a pizza shop soon after graduation and then an Italian restaurant. Both were undermarketed and undercapitalized, he says. "A very expensive lesson." Buying back the pizza enterprise in 1997, he started to do a little catering, garnering a reputation and a following. Two years later, he answered a newspaper ad placed by the Inventors Hall of Fame in Akron which was seeking a preferred caterer. He was selected, somewhat to his surprise. He began wondering what else was out there.

By 2000 he got a Preferred Caterer contract with Stan Hywet Hall and Gardens in Akron, then Hale Farm and Village, and the Pro Football Hall of Fame in Canton. Between 2008 and 2012 he handled 24 Hall of Fame induction parties at the latter. "One year we fed 1900 people at five induction parties at the same time in separate air conditioned tents," he recalls with a note of recalled exhaustion.



Throughout the years, Pacanovsky's firm became a preferred caterer at an astounding 15 venues. "We kept evolving and re-inventing ourselves," he says. Then groups began asking him to help plan major events. "We became the one-stop-shop for events in the area."

Such volume demanded a well-trained staff, so Pacanovsky created a 7-hour training program for his employees. "People need to know how they look and act while serving others, and how those factors affected themselves and my company," he says. Colleagues suggested he share his knowledge, so



he did just that, creating a consulting practice. Training, public speaking, and coaching became his new passion. However, to pursue his new love, he realized that bi-locating was not practical so he decided in 2014 to sell his catering business and launched The Vātion Group as a full-time effort.

It was a difficult decision, he says, especially parting with a loyal staff he had worked closely with for nearly a decade. "But I needed to make the decision for the future of my career," says Pacanovsky.

BEHAVIOR AND BRANDING

One's personal brand and that of their employer are demonstrated by personal appearance, behavior, and action. Even dining habits reflect and tell who you are. According to Pacanovsky, table conversation is a lost art. "The topics of politics, religion, and sex are deal killers," he says. These are up there with not making eye contact, texting during a business meeting, answering the phone during a conversation or sending email

during a business lunch. "It's the new rude," he points out, but tragically commonplace. The importance of the first impression is more than an old saw, it sets the stage.

During his many keynotes, workshops, and seminars, he informs his audience that "wherever we go, whether we are on the clock or off it, our public behavior can greatly influence the potential for business opportunities." Weddings, he quips, can often be "amateur hour," with young professionals forgetting that their antics in front of current or potential employers or supervisors can send a message of irresponsibility. "Today, with a smart phone in the hands of nearly everyone, you can be the subject of video, audio, or photographs without even being aware you are becoming part of a permanent record. It is not a matter of if, but when.

Admittedly, a lot of what Pacanovsky teaches is common sense. At least you would think so. Yet, millions of dollars in sales and thousands of careers are

affected by bad behavior in public. Sadly, such skills are not generally acquired through a formal education.

Businesses and organizations large and small seek out Pacanovsky's business etiquette and behavior, much of which is not yet part of employee handbooks. His wisdom is directed at front-line business associates who represent their corporations, from executives to sales reps.

Until Pacanovsky can make a house call to your business, the best advice he can give is to "Watch your behavior, someone else always is."

Dominican Republic Mission Trip - Mission Possible











Mission Possible was established in December of 2006 as an outreach effort under the direction of Fr. **Bob Stec '79** of St. Ambrose Parish. The instigation for the mission trip to Higuey was a conversation with Archbishop Timothy Broglio, then Papal Nuncio, to the Dominican Republic. He recounted story after story of the extreme poverty and lack of advocacy that challenged the Haitian refugees living in the Dominican Republic.

The Mission is a network of churches in Northeast Ohio and community members that are sending missionaries to the Dominican Republic to improve the quality of life for the poorest of the poor in the DR. This summer seven Padua students had the opportunity to travel to Higuey, Dominican Republic. The mission involved both physical and spiritual labor. Volunteers spent a week building homes in a small village and worked with village children, teaching them valuable lessons in vacation bible school.

St. Francis School Partnership

In response to Bishop Anthony Pilla's call for solidarity in the region among Catholics in the Cleveland Diocese, Padua began a "Church in the City" partnership with St. Francis Elementary School on the east side of Cleveland (East 71st St. and Superior Avenue) in the mid-1990s.

Since then, our partnership has grown and blossomed into a well-developed relationship which reaches almost all grade levels at both schools.

Currently, Padua students participate in a variety of activities including weekly visits for tutoring 8th grade students at Saint Francis, and visiting and playing with the younger students as a part of the extended day program.



Christian Service Program

Through the Gospel mandate of Jesus Christ, we are called as Christians to take up our "basin and towel" to love and serve as Christ did. Through Padua's Christian Service Program, all students are offered the gifts of humility and poverty in spirit as they follow the example of Saint Francis in loving service to others through Jesus Christ. Students are also prepared to begin the challenge "to respond compassionately to the contemporary demands of a global society."

Students are required to perform four years of Christian Service at Padua. "Padua students are taught that service is not something you do one time. It's not about how many hours of service you complete, but more about making service a part of who you are while at Padua and beyond," said Matt Harley, Campus Minister.

Service begins as freshman with family, church and school and moves all the way through senior year focusing on social justice. "Our service program focuses on relationship building with the goal of expanding their circle of service over four years."

As freshman, the focus of family service is split between acts of service to members of their immediate or extended

family as well as to service to Padua or the their church/ parish. The focus during sophomore year shifts to the community and the "marginalized" during



junior year. These three years prepare students to move from direct action to social action during senior year social justice advocacy. As part of their senior Theology course work, students take a social justice class and are required to choose different issues to research. Seniors will participate in an advocacy project where they will learn about and speak on behalf of the poor and vulnerable in our society.

"A major aspect of the social justice course is training the students to speak on behalf of those who cannot speak for themselves."

"One of the words often used to describe our school is "welcoming" and as I walked into the walled city of Assisi for the first time, I felt at home. This feeling was reinforced by the people we met and the events during our time there. As a science teacher, my knowledge of St. Francis and St. Clare was limited. Now that I have walked the same streets as they did over nine hundred years ago, I have a greater understanding of what being Franciscan means and where this "welcoming" tradition originates. One of the greatest gifts of this pilgrimage was the time to focus on how Franciscan values touch my teaching and other aspects of my life. Since 2001 Padua faculty and staff members have been given the opportunity to participate in a pilgrimage in Assisi, Italy.

The two week faculty and staff Assisi Pilgrimage takes place every summer and was established by former president, Fr. Walter Dolan, ofm so that not only the friars, but the faculty and staff would have a deeper appreciation of the Franciscan Charism and be collaborators in living out and passing on the Franciscan heritage and tradition, and the

values and ideals which are essential elements of the life and work of the Padua Franciscan community.

The experience is an intense study that includes immersing each pilgrim in the historical context of Francis' time, examining the spiritual basis of each action and event, and reflecting how the message of Francis remains relevant today in our own lives and vocations. The two-week pilgrimage includes classroom lecture, personal reflection, and the opportunity to visit some of the holiest of places where Francis lived and preached.


National Honor Society inducted 81 new members. NHS is the nation's premier organization established to recognize outstanding high

GIRLS BASKETBALL

The Lady Bruins finished their season 14–12 overall and 7–3 in the North Coast League (NCL) Blue Division. The girls were district champions making it to the regional semifinals (sweet sixteen) for the first time since 2004.

WRESTLING

Padua's wrestlers finished 7th in the state in Division II. They were the only Northeast Ohio School to finish in the top-ten. They finished 3rd as a team at Districts and were runners-up at Sectionals. There were several individual accomplishments this year. Senior, **Joshua Mason** surpassed the 100th career victory mark at Districts, was Sectional runner-up and was a NCL champion. Senior, **Paul Petras** was a state qualifier, sectional runner-up and surpassed the 150th career victory mark at the NCL Tournament. Senior **Kyle Kaminski** was a state runner up at 145 lbs, District and Sectional champion. Kyle surpassed 150 careers wins and was the NCL champion for the third year in a row.

Junior, **Anthony DeCesare** was also a state runner-up at 113 lbs., as well as a District and Sectional champ. He too surpassed 100 career wins at the regional state dual quarterfinals. Senior, **Ryan McCullough** surpassed the 100th career victory mark at this year's Catholic Invitational Tournament.

SWIMMING

Senior **Nicholai Moysaenko** qualified for the state swimming meet in the 100 meter breaststroke finishing 10th overall. He was the first male swimmer to qualify since 1990 (Greg Bakos). The 200 meter medley relay team of **Matt Laneve '18, Keagan Giordano '15, Andrew Moysaenko '15**, and **Nicholai Moysaenko '15** also qualified for the state meet with a school record of 1.43.44. This was the first boys relay team to qualify for states since 1974.

BOWLING


The girls bowling team were NCL champs with Senior **Isabella Panza** being named NCL MVP for the second year in a row.
